

LINCOLN BOARD OF SELECTMEN
Public Hearing of September 2, 2015
Lincoln Community Center - Lincoln, NH

Present: O.J. Robinson, Patricia McTeague, and Jayne Ludwig.

Staff Present: Town Manager Alfred Burbank, Fire Chief Ron Beard, Police Chief Smith, Recreation Director Tara Tower, Community Center Coordinator Justin Chaffee, and Recording Secretary Brook Rose.

Public Present: See attached sign in sheet.

I. CALL TO ORDER

O.J. Robinson called the meeting to order at 5:37pm and welcomed all in attendance.

II. PUBLIC HEARING ON PROPOSED TOWN SKATE PARK

O.J. began by explaining that the Board is holding this hearing on the proposed skate park and the proposed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Town and the Lincoln Woodstock Friends of Recreation and would like to hear from all interested parties. O.J. proceeded to give an overview of the history of the proposed skate park and the Riverwalk Park plan which was accepted by the Town of Lincoln Village Core Committee in 1993. The idea of integrating a skate park into that plan was introduced in 2001. He explained that according to a survey done in 1993, there was an overwhelming response from townspeople that expressed their desire to have the land around the river maintained for a riverfront park and wanted to see a town owned recreational facility by the river. In 2013, the Town committed to a landscape design for the riverfront park to commence with the plans for the location of the skate park. O.J. explained that the MOU up for discussion this evening is an agreement with the Friends of Recreation. The agreement specifies that the Town will accept the gift of the skate park once it has been built and will take over ownership and maintenance of the park as part of the Town's riverfront recreational area. As parking has also been part of the Riverwalk Park plan since the 1990's, the Board intends to maintain a parking area also. This design will offer a much needed parking lot that will also serve the downtown area.

At this time, the Board invited Skate Park Committee representative Kevin Bell to give a presentation on the proposed park. The presentation is attached.

Kevin explained that the Committee is working to build awareness for the concept of the park as it has been an on again off again concept. The Committee is working to inform the community that they are committed to the project; they have raised money and are a serious committee.

At this time Recreation Director Tara Tower addressed the audience. She stated that in the 17 years she has been the Recreation Director for the Town of Lincoln the skate park has always been something that residents wished to see in this Town. The idea started with a group of students and their parents back in 2001. Tara gave a history of the initiatives over the years to develop a park. She addressed location issues and stated that the riverfront park location was chosen as the ideal location for residents and tourists alike. Having a park close to Main Street will increase revenue potential to local businesses. The development of a skate park will also kick off the initiative to build a town recreation park on the river front as well as to provide additional parking for the Town. Tara also pointed out that the Kanc Recreation area is closed during the Town's summer camps which leaves no recreational area for people to go. She added that the goal of the Village Core Committee and the Riverwalk Park was to connect it to the Riverwalk path extending all the way up to Loon Mountain Resort. Further, Tara went on to say that the Town of Woodstock does offset Lincoln's recreation budget by 50%. She added that in the Town's most recently completed survey, the overwhelming majority of people wanted to see additional free recreation and a town park. Tara then read a statement (attached) from the Town's insurance company (Primex) offering their support of the project.

At this time O.J. invited Police Chief Smith to speak. Chief Smith stated that when he was Police Chief in another town, he helped to build a skate board park. The park brought the kids and the community together. The Police Department really supported the park. Chief Smith offered his full support of the park in the proposed location. He commended the great work of the Committee.

The Board opened the hearing to the rest of the audience.

Representative Edmond Gionet spoke and thanked Kevin for his great presentation. He stated that as a life time resident of the Town he would like to see the Town pursue a more realistic investment for Lincoln. He stated that the track record of skate parks is short lived in other communities and that this project will be a huge liability to the Town. He stated that he would like to see the park relocated to the Town's recreation area and if that cannot be done, he would like the project scrapped and taken up in another community.

Lincoln Woodstock Chamber Executive Director Alyssa Yolda stated that the Chamber's Board of Directors met and voted unanimously in support of the skate park.

Joe Lahout stated that he is a business owner in Lincoln and a resident in Littleton. He recently attended an auction at Jean's Playhouse in support of the skate park. He was shocked that there were 200 people there. He had gone expecting to see a bunch of teenagers but there were mostly young couples and young families. He stated that Lincoln has a core of wonderful young people here and the Town should support them and keep them in this area. This is the generation that will drive the community for the next twenty to thirty years and it's important for people to

support them. He stated that having a park by the river where people can recreate is a wonderful idea.

Alex Clogston stated that he is a lifelong resident of North Woodstock. His sister was recently killed in a skateboard accident in Lisbon. He stated that if Lisbon had a skate park this might not have happened. He feels we owe it to the kids to have a safe place to recreate.

David Clemence-Schreiner, owner of property in both Lincoln and Woodstock, stated that he taught high school special education for 26 years in MA and that he now drives the bus at LinWood High School. He hears from his students all of the time that there is nothing to do here and no place to go to have fun. He stated that when he was growing up there were places to go and hang out, roller skating rinks, ice rinks etc. He feels the Town needs a place for the kids to go and be safe.

Dennis Ducharme resident of Lincoln and representative of the new Riverwalk resort and InnSeasons resorts stated that he is in favor of the park at the proposed location provided that it is well planned and thought out. He stated that it took him and his team eight years to plan the Riverwalk Resort. He would suggest the Skate Park Committee sit down and talk to their neighbors including him and the owners of the local shops. He stated that the community has resources and may be able to help with the development of the park. He has already made a commitment to the Planning Board and Board of Selectmen to rebuild the Riverwalk Trail this spring as it was washed out during Hurricane Irene. Further, he stated that he has resources that could move this skate park project forward as he believes the Town needs more recreational opportunities for residents and visitors alike. He complimented the Committee for the great work they have done so far.

Lincoln resident Tammy Gionet Dutilly spoke and stated that her career for 33 years has involved children. She questioned what happens to the other kids in the community that don't skateboard. She questioned what the Town is doing to make their currently run down recreational areas inviting to everyone. She stated that the skate park will increase traffic during the busy seasons and that the skate park will not even be used during the winter. She added that a skate park will be a place where the heroin pushers can pawn off drugs to kids. It will be a place for vandalizing. She questioned that when this skateboarding fad is over, what will happen to the park? The Board needs to seriously consider the other children in this area as there is nothing here for them. She asked they take everyone into consideration and not just a certain group.

Roy Whitaker, Lincoln resident and Lincoln business owner stated that he supports the project and thanked the Committee for all of their work.

Paul Beaudin, Lincoln resident stated that he agrees with Dennis Ducharme and thinks there needs to be more planning involved. He stated he supports the park but not in the proposed location. He stated that he recently saw some bicyclists get hit in the center of town. He

believes that mixing skateboards and bikes is a safety factor on Main Street. He stated that the Town really needs more downtown parking. The Board needs to take a long hard look at this as it will impact the Town for years.

Danny Surette former resident of Lincoln and current resident in Albany, NH stated that he has spent the last few years in Lake Tahoe, California. He spent almost every day at the skate park there and got to know the community. The skate park culture is one of the safest and most comfortable environments there is. The people protect their area and will not let it turn into a seedy scary place for people.

Matt Manning, North Woodstock resident, stated that in response to the prior comments about all children being supported in this community, he stated that the Town offers skiing at a low cost. The Recreation Department offers basketball, soccer, baseball, and many other activities. He stated that it is this (skateboarding) group of children and adults that don't have a safe place to recreate. Further, he stated that heroin is not a respecter of persons that singles out skate boarders alone.

Heather Krill, teacher at LinWood and resident of Woodstock, stated that a skate park is an awesome idea. She has been at LinWood for 12 years and has seen groups of kids getting excited for a skate park over the years and it doesn't come to fruition. She thinks now is the time. She stated that her husband Geoff Krill loves wheels of all kinds. He is the Executive Director of Eastern Adaptive Sports and has asked her to read a letter of support on behalf of Eastern Adaptive Sports for the park. The letter stated that this skate park can only be a good thing for the kids and adults, both with and without disabilities, in this community. Geoff has some great ideas about how to utilize the park but stated in the letter that they can't be tried out if the community doesn't give the skate park a chance. Geoff further offered to assist with any ADA compliance issues.

Mark Morris, Lincoln resident and owner of Pub 32, strongly supports the park. He stated that it is a great endeavor for the kids.

Molly Mahar, Lincoln resident, strongly supports this initiative and congratulates the Committee on a job well done with the fundraising. She stated that she works to bring tourists to this community and it would be a good amenity for the local kids and tourists. A park is good for their safety. She would like to see a solid plan in place for the parcel of town land that is designated for a riverfront park.

David Thompson, Lincoln resident, stated that he supports the project in the proposed area. He stated that he has a history with a recreation facility in a residential area and thus supports the park in the currently planned location.

Robert Wetherell, Lincoln resident, fully supports the park in the area presented. He stated that he knows one person that lives in Littleton and drives all the way to Concord to use their skate

park. He added that some families stay in Waterville because there is a skate park there. He stated that the Committee isn't rushing into this project as they have only raised 13% of the total cost to construct the park. This is a long term commitment and they need to know the Town is behind their endeavors.

Tammy Ham, Lincoln resident, encouraged the Board not to have a deadline on the proposed MOU in the event it takes some time to raise the funds to build the park. O.J. Robinson replied that there is no deadline on the MOU.

Gus Noffke, resident of Lincoln, stated that he grew up in central Wisconsin where he was on a committee to build a skate park. Their committee faced a lot of the same issues and misconceptions. He stated that the proposed park is centrally located which makes it easier for kids that don't have cars to get to it. Gus is in the tourism industry and frequently sends families looking for a skate park to Waterville Valley. He added that the skate park in Wisconsin is still in use and hasn't lost popularity but rather has gained it. He stated that this is a great group of people looking to build their community. This park would be a great asset for the community.

Rick Kelly, Lincoln resident and President of Loon Mountain Resort, stated that he was on the original committee to build a skate park back in 2001. He believes that the current Skate Park Committee has done a great job. The park is well thought out and he believes the community should show their support and make this happen.

Ian Feliney, Lincoln resident, stated that he works in the snow and skate board industry as a sales representative. He stated that he does a lot more business with communities that have skate parks and that the local businesses could really benefit from the park. He grew up skateboarding in NY and skateboarding has increased and is not just a passing fad. The sport of skateboarding has saved a lot of his friends as it is a passion and an art form available to everybody.

O.J. proceeded to read the attached letters of support submitted to the Town for tonight's meeting.

As there were no further comments from the audience, O.J. closed the public hearing at 6:50pm. The Board discussed their opinions about the park.

Jayne Ludwig stated that her major concern is safety and that the park isn't well planned or thought out. There are issues that need to be addressed specifically on Main Street. She stated that Main Street does not have the capacity to handle the high volume of vehicular traffic not to mention bicycles and skateboards. She mentioned that this is a safety issue for the kids because they're not going to stay in the park all day. They're going to travel on Main Street. She suggested a possible additional lane on Main Street for bicyclists and boarders.

Patricia McTeague stated that the Town and local businesses have had some issues with skateboarders on private property. She feels there is a huge need for a skate park and she is in favor of signing the MOU.

O.J. Robinson stated that the proposed location of the park is ideal. This Committee is giving the Town a skate park which will be the first step in building the Town's riverfront park. He stated that this MOU protects the Town as well as the Committee. The design of the park and the surrounding area falls under the jurisdiction of the Board. This park has been 25-30 years in the making and the Town is finally at the first step. The parking lot is key and is a step towards solving some of the parking issues on Main Street.

MOTION: "To execute the Memorandum of Understanding with the Lincoln Woodstock Friends of Recreation."

Motion: McTeague Second: Robinson Motion carries with Ludwig opposed.

O.J. and Patricia signed the MOU followed by loud cheering and applause from the audience.

The meeting adjourned at 7:00pm.

To whom it may concern,

I am writing this letter of support of the Lin-Wood Skate Park to the Town of Lincoln as a Father, skateboarder, but mostly as a Police Officer in the local area.

I strongly believe that a skate park is very beneficial for the community and its youth. Growing up in Northern Vermont I experienced the similar issues as does the youth of Northern New Hampshire. The issue of if you don't participate in "organized" or "recognized" extra-curricular activities, there was nothing to do.

As a teenager we had received permission from a local store manager to skate in the back of the building. Occasionally complaints would get called in from customers just because they thought skateboarding was a crime. The local police would arrive but would quickly realize that we were doing nothing wrong and had permission to be on the property. This eventually became a very positive contact with the police as they would swing by and chat with us and watch us.

Now as a father I realize even more how important it is to have a place for skateboarders to practice their hobby/sport. They provide a place where youth can have a safe and legal place to have some fun and maybe a find a passion for a sport that they would normally not. Most parks I've been to you will see parents bringing their children to watch them and also older skaters who are working on their tricks. These children see that tricks happen in real life and not just on the internet and want to learn themselves providing a drive to progress. Skateboarding is a constructive and positive activity for the community.

As a Police Officer I see it as a very easy way for the Police to have "positive" contact with the community and its youth as most Police contacts are related to or remembered as negative events. I have heard concerns related to behavior of some skateboarders but I personally believe most of those worries are overstated, exaggerated, or misguided.

I strongly believe that a public skate parks do not encourage illicit behavior but actually help reduce it. It provides a place for the community to go instead of illegally going on private property and possibly damaging property. A simple search on the internet will provide many resources and statistics that support skate parks and their role in reducing crime and illicit behavior in the area.

I want to emphasize the importance of not just putting in ramps and boxes but building a "properly designed" skate park. If a skate park that just consists of temporary ramps that are just put there to say they have a skate park, the interest will quickly diminish. Not to mention the ramps will constantly need repair and the park will become very unsafe. A properly designed and built skate park will provide a long lasting and safe place for the community.

Thank you and I hope the Town of Lincoln is able and willing to support the Lin-Wood Skate Park.
