LINCOLN BOARD OF SELECTMEN MEETING MINUTES

MARCH 5, 2018 - 5:30PM

Board of Selectmen Present: Chairman OJ Robinson, Tamra Ham and Jayne Ludwig

I. CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Robinson called the meeting to order at 5:38 pm.

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II. REVIEW AND APPROVAL-MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING

The Board postponed the review and approval of the February 26, 2018 meeting minutes to the next scheduled Board of Selectmen's meeting on March 12, 2018.

III. Warrant Article Review with Moderator Robert Wetherell

The Board reviewed the warrant articles with Town Moderator, Robert Wetherell and discussed which Selectmen would be addressing the various warrant articles in the event questions arise. Articles one (1) through six (6) will be voted on during the day (Planning), and all relevant literature will be available as well as Office Assistant, Mary Pelchat who will be sitting in for Carole Bont (Town Planner) who will not be in attendance due to a family member having surgery. Chairman Robinson also noted a correction to the Vitals page in the Town Report (name spelled incorrect) and asked Moderator Wetherell to verbally correct this at Town Meeting.

Upon conclusion of the discussion, Moderator Wetherell departed the meeting at 6:10 p.m.

IV. OLD/NEW BUSINESS

Town Manager's Report

Water flow testing for Lahout's Plaza and the new proposed hotel (across from Franklin Street) Engineers hired by Lahout's Plaza and the proprietors of the new proposed hotel across from Franklin Street will be conducting water flow testing tomorrow (March 6th). Lahout's Plaza needs an entirely new sprinkler system and is required to know the amount of water available to design the system accordingly.

Chief Beard was toned to the Lodge at Lincoln Station this past weekend and noted that residents are leaving their faucets running full tilt in an effort to deter their pipes from freezing. Beard also noted that the condo unit has detailed written instructions for the occupants to leave both the hot and cold water running during the winter months, as well as to turn off the hot water breaker so they don't waste electricity. Town Manager Burbank said this is another example of why it would be in the best interest of the town to meter the water usage and track the consumption of household's town wide.

Sale of Tower Fire Truck

The town has received the electronic payment for \$5,000 for the sale of the old tower truck. The truck was sold to Manassas, Virginia Fire Department who will be coming to pick the truck up.

Coffee with a Cop

Chief Smith will be meeting with resident voters at 6:00 p.m. prior to Town Meeting to discuss whatever is on their minds and introduce the new officers to the residents.

Hoyle & Tanner

Town Manager Burbank has spoken with Chris Mulleavey and they will be coordinating a date and time to meet with the Select Board. Dubois & King will also be scheduling a day to come in and meet with the Board as well.

Clearbrook Lots

Selectman Ham asked what the town was doing with the two (2) lots the town now owns as a result of tax lien. Chairman Robinson was not certain as the lots were located on steep frontage with no practical access and questioned whether or not they were buildable. Selectman Ham felt that even if we sold them below market price, this would at least put the lots back on the tax role and create revenue. Chairman Robinson suggested that after Town Meeting the Board review the Board of Selectmen goals for 2017 and update them for the current year, and they will add the Clearbrook lots to the list.

Public Participation

Recreation Grant for Riverfront Park

Paul Beaudin asked the Board how large the parcel of land is pertaining to the portion of the Riverfront Park grant, and if the matching grant program that the town is applying for covers the entire Riverfront Park lot, or just a portion of the lot. Selectman Ham explained that the grant covers Phase I of the project (parking, multi-use trail, playground, restroom facility, storm water, Skate Park, and canoe launch). Beaudin added that according to the stipulations of the grant, elements of the park that pertain to the grant must be held in perpetuity for recreation purposes and the town would not be able to utilize the land for any other reasons. Mr. Beaudin felt this was important information for the Board prior to committing the entire parcel of land as stipulated by the grant criteria. Burbank added that the grant covers Phase I and not the entire parcel of land and was not certain if we have even assigned acreage to it. Burbank also noted that since the town has applied for the grant, DES has stepped in and required the town to remediate what is left of the sewage in the depression which cannot just be covered over as originally thought. Another DES issue is that they want assurance that there are no residual heavy metals in the ground (left over from Burndy) which will require further testing.

Beaudin asked if the town would still be requesting \$200K in the event they do not receive the award for the matching grant program. Chairman Robinson explained that the warrant article wording states that \$400K is to be appropriated, however, limits the town's appropriation to \$200K and then to be able to expend the grant up to another \$200K. This will allow the town to prep for the Skate Board Park and parking lot (and possibly water and sewer).

Levee

Paul Beaudin asked if the town has made any progress with the engineering firm contracted to work on the levee in sharing with the \$400k storm damage costs. Chairman Robinson explained that the engineers have agreed to meet with the Board (although they are denying liability), however, a date has not been established.

Roger Harrington asked who decided where to begin the construction work on the levee. Burbank noted

he was told it was all about "means and methods" and the town could not dictate how the job should be done. Paul Beaudin also asked if the contract with the engineers stated that they had to carry liability insurance. Burbank explained that he would have to research this because the contract was signed in 2011 before he began working for the town.

Roger Harrington also asked about Forest Ridge and if there was any progress up at *The Pines*. Burbank explained that he has met with Rick Elliot and the town's attorney, and Horizons Engineering has reviewed the designs. The Elliot's have agreed to bring in Horizons Engineering (when the snow melts) to determine if the ponds were built as designed and according to Planning Board approval. Burbank noted one thing that did come out of the meeting is that the ponds were not meant to retain water, and only one (1) of the ponds was meant to hold a small amount of water. Paul Beaudin asked if bonds were posted for the project. Burbank explained that on-road and off-road bonds were provided to the town but not on the infrastructure.

Pollard Road Sidewalk

Roger Harrington asked Town Manager Burbank when his tree was going to be planted (suggested the spring or fall). Burbank said he would speak with Taylor Beaudin and make arrangements to plant the tree whenever Roger would like.

Selectman Ham mentioned that she had been approached by two (2) residents wondering if donated benches could be installed along the walkway on Pollard Road. Ham asked Burbank to speak with Town Engineer Ray Korber to find out where he would suggest placing benches (and how many could be placed) on Pollard Road and then address this in the near future.

Town Clerk's Motor Vehicle Revenue Report through February 2018

Total year-to-date is \$63,593.48. The month of February is up by \$1,859.64 from February, 2017. The year-to-date is up \$10,227.48.

Road Ban Signs

James Welsh asked why certain roadways and streets in town were not posted with weight restriction signs. Burbank said he would speak with Public Works Director, Nate Hadaway.

Trust Fund Transfers

The Board signed transfers for the Trust Funds.

Land Use Permits for the Pines

The Board reviewed four (4) Land Use Permits.
